COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Identification of nutritional problems and resources available in the community.
Management of nutrition services, provision of nutrition information/education to the public, and the legislative process.

1. Explain the characteristics, functions and processes of a community and identify the role of nutrition in health promotion.
2. Describe the objectives of community nutrition programs.
3. List the goals of a community assessment and describe the different methods for assessing nutritional status and health in the community.
4. Describe the legislative and regulatory processes and ways they influence policy,

5. Describe the processes in designing, implementing and evaluating a community nutrition program.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods

We will review the role of nutrition in the community, public policy's impact on nutrition programs and the program planning process. Activities include discussions of timely topics, application of knowledge through quizzes and exams, and a project planning a community nutrition program

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

This is a college level course requiring students to be disciplined, self-motivated, and good managers of their time. This 3-hour credit course and can require up to 9 hours of commitment each week. Some weeks may require less. Time will be spent reading course materials and actively participating in lab activities. It is expected that you read the material we are covering in class that day prior to arriving so you are prepared and ready to discuss in class.

- Stay up-to-date with announcements and content of the course via D2L. I recommend downloading the pulse app or turning on notifications for any courses updates/changes.
- Read the textbook and others course materials as assigned.
- Demonstrate knowledge of material covered in class through assignments, discussion and in class participation.
- Complete assignments and exams on scheduled dates and time deadlines.
- Use critical thinking skills by independently gathering information and then developing your own opinion.

Community Assessment Paper (100 points)

Complete a community needs assessment utilizing a survey or through data already collected through other agencies. You will select a population of interest and write a paper summarizing your findings following the needs assessment steps we cover in class.

Community Program Plan (200 points)

Create and develop a nutrition education program plan that could be implemented in the community. The plan will be based on the needs assessment done on your selected population and summarized in your community assessment paper. Groups will then present their presentation in class or if able to their selected community.
