COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

HIST 1301: A broad interdisciplinary course in the historical development of the United States and North America to 1877. Assignments will focus on reading, writing, and analysis. Prerequisites: **ENG 1301** or concurrent enrollment or **ENG 1302** or concurrent enrollment.

Materials – Textbooks, Readings, Supplementary Readings

Required Texts: American Yawp (Free Online)

Materials: Chromebook, 3 Inch Binder, Composition Book or Notebook

Student Learning Outcomes

As a Core Curriculum requirement, this class focuses on four common Student Learning Outcomes:

1. **Critical Thinking** - Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.
2. **Oral/Visual Communication** - Students will communicate in a manner appropriate to audience and occasion with an evident message and organizational structure.
3. **Personal Responsibility** - Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
4. **Social Responsibility** - Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues.

Student Learning Outcomes will be assessed by the Student Responsibility Quiz and a Primary Source Analysis assignment.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods and Assessment

Assignments, Student Responsibilities, Expectations, and Tips for Success

Instruction in this course is delivered through a combination of direct instruction and collaborative group activities, with an emphasis on fostering critical thinking. Students will analyze primary and secondary sources, engage in structured discussions, and participate in project-based learning aligned with the historical themes covered throughout the semester. Instructional content is organized chronologically, beginning with Indigenous America and concluding with the Civil War and Reconstruction.

Assessment of student learning will occur through a variety of formal and informal methods. These include, but are not limited to:

- **Written Examinations** (Midterm and Final) assessing content knowledge and analytical skills
- **Socratic Debate** students will engage in evidence-based academic discussions in which they analyze historical questions, defend positions using primary and secondary sources, respectfully challenge opposing viewpoints, and demonstrate critical thinking through civil discourse.
- **Discussion Board Assignments** requiring written responses to primary source documents and reflective prompts
- **Technology-Based Projects**, such as an Early American Citizen Profile and a historical timeline
- **Creative Group Projects**, including the production of historical video skits to demonstrate thematic understanding

Students are expected to complete all readings, actively participate in discussions, and submit assignments by posted deadlines. Assessments are designed to measure both content mastery and the development of historical thinking skills essential for success in postsecondary academic environments.

Student Responsibility Quiz: Students will complete a responsibility quiz at the beginning of the course to ensure they understand institutional expectations.

Primary Source Analysis Assignment: This assignment asks students to analyze information, communicate clearly and effectively, and show awareness of social and civil issues or problems. Using the selected primary source document, students should write 1-2 paragraphs that: (1) identify the

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author/creator and context of the document (including when and where it was created); (2) consider the purpose of the document, including the author's goals in its creation and its intended audience; and (3) evaluate the document, analyzing why this document is important to help understand the historical period or the events it describes (its significance), and how the document contributes to our historical understanding of the period (historical causes and effect). The written analysis should be presented using full and complete sentences and proper grammar and punctuation.

Tips for Success

- Stay current with all readings and assignments—falling behind will make it difficult to succeed.
- Reach out promptly if you encounter challenges; communication is key.
- Participate actively and thoughtfully in all discussions and group projects.
- Proofread all written assignments for grammar, clarity, and historical accuracy.
- Adhere strictly to academic integrity standards—plagiarism and misuse of AI tools will not be tolerated.
- Manage your time effectively, especially for larger projects and exams.

COURSE AND UNIVERSITY PROCEDURES/POLICIES

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

If the student has extenuating circumstances that prevent the student from completing projects, quizzes, seminars, or participating in class by the due date, it is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor to make alternative arrangements before the due date whenever possible. Acceptance of late

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work is at the discretion of the instructor, and the instructor may require the student to provide evidence/documentation for verification. Prior notification does not automatically result in a waiver of the late penalties.

Examples of extenuating circumstances where grace should be given to students may include but are not limited to: personal/family member hospitalization, death in the immediate family, weather/environmental evacuation due to fire/hurricane, or active military assignment where internet connectivity is unavailable for a limited time period. **General computer-related issues and internet connectivity issues are not considered extenuating circumstances.** Students must ensure the technology they are using is compatible with East Texas A&M's technology requirements and contact IT if they are experiencing any problems with their D2L accounts.

APA Style

Unless otherwise stated, students are expected to adhere to the APA editorial style in all written work and in discussion forums, citing and referencing work appropriately. There are three basic purposes of citing and referencing: 1) Appropriate credit is given for the sources of information, 2) add credence to original work when informing the reader of sources of information, and 3) avoid plagiarism and academic dishonesty.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism is the theft of someone else's intellectual property. It is a very serious infraction in higher education. If it is determined that a student has plagiarized any writing, the consequences will be decided by the professor. This could include a grade of zero and/or a referral to receive disciplinary measures.

AI Technology

Artificial Intelligence (AI) refers to technology capable of generating or assisting with written work and other academic products. Students are expected to follow all East Texas A&M University policies regarding the appropriate use of AI. Unless otherwise specified by the instructor, any use of AI must be properly documented in accordance with university policy. Undocumented or unauthorized use of AI may constitute academic dishonesty and may result in a grade of zero on the assignment and/or referral for disciplinary action.

To protect both the student and the integrity of the course, **all written assignments—including discussion board responses—must first be composed and saved in a Google Doc using the student's Whitehouse ISD Google account.** Students should not type assignments directly into D2L discussion boards or other submission platforms.

If the originality of a student's work is questioned or if submitted work indicates possible unauthorized AI use, the student will be required to provide the original Google Doc, including the document's version history and timestamps, to the professor. The version history will be reviewed as part of the academic integrity process to help verify the authenticity and development of the student's work. Failure to provide the requested Google Doc and version history may result in the assignment being treated as a potential academic integrity violation.

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EXAMS

Exams MUST be taken on the day announced. School functions/activities are not an excuse to miss an exam. Students must contact the instructor prior to any event to take the exam. Absences will require a doctor's note to allow the exam to be taken after the announced test date. Plagiarized work and the use of AI presented as the student's original work will result in a 0 on the assignment with a discipline referral.

EXAM DAYS

On exam/testing days (including makeup testing days) students will abide by all instructions of the professor. Students will have no devices (including tablets, phones, and smart watches) on their desk or on their person during the exam. All belongings are required to be at the front of the classroom with devices placed inside and turned off or on airplane mode. If computers are necessary for a portion of the exam, students shall have all other tabs closed. Any other tabs open or extensions added to the page will result in an automatic grade of zero. Students will only have their Chromebook on their desk during the computer portion of the exam (closed water containers are also allowed on desks). You must inform the professor if you have any internet connectivity issues. Failure to do so could result in a 0 if academic integrity is questioned. During the written portion of the exam, students will only have a personal pen or pencil on desk (closed water containers are also allowed on desks). The professor will provide the students with the testing papers along with notebook paper to write their essay answers during the exam. Any other items on the desk or surrounding the desk of the student will result in a grade of zero on the exam. Failure to follow these procedures will result in a grade of 0, disciplinary action, and/or possible expulsion from the course.

Classroom Behavior

This is a college-level course. Every student is expected to contribute to and maintain a safe, respectful, and academically professional classroom environment. Any negative, disrespectful, or derogatory comments directed toward another student will result in immediate disciplinary consequences through Whitehouse High School administration. Consistent disregard for proper classroom etiquette or behavior may result in a grade of zero for the weekly assignment, including exams, failure of the course, and/or removal from the course.

Throughout the semester, we will examine historical events and topics that may involve differing perspectives, difficult subject matter, or issues that continue to generate thoughtful discussion today. As college students, you are expected to approach these conversations with intellectual curiosity, critical thinking, and mutual respect. You are not required to agree with every viewpoint presented; however, you are expected to engage in civil, evidence-based discussion while treating your classmates and instructor with professionalism and respect at all times.

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Interaction with Instructor Statement

Students are encouraged to maintain open and respectful communication with the instructor throughout the course. Questions, concerns, or requests for clarification regarding course material, assignments, or expectations should be addressed promptly. The preferred method of communication is via email, and students can generally expect a response within 24 hours on weekdays.

If needed, individual meetings or virtual office hours may be scheduled by request. Students are also encouraged to seek assistance early, rather than waiting until an assignment is due or after grades are posted.

Professional communication is expected at all times. Emails should include a proper greeting, full name, course name, and a clear explanation of the question or concern. Students should regularly check their email and the course platform for updates and feedback from the instructor.

The instructor is committed to supporting student success and is available to help clarify material, offer feedback, and guide students through the course.

Syllabus Change Policy

The syllabus is a guide. Circumstances and events, such as student progress, may make it necessary for the instructor to modify the syllabus during the semester. Any changes made to the syllabus will be announced in advance.
