COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Introduces students to the workings and interrelationships of the U.S. and world economies. Covers economic analysis principles, including aggregate economic activity, national income determination, monetary and fiscal policy, and business fluctuations. Focuses on real-world problems like poverty, inflation, unemployment, and economic instability.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

- 1.1. Explain how choices and trade improve welfare.

- 2.2. Use the supply and demand model to describe individual decision makers, an industry, and the economy as a whole.
- 3.3. Calculate features of the economy given a simplified dataset and discuss the limitations and benefits of using each construct to describe the economy.
- 4.4. Model the effects on society of changes in macroeconomic variables.
- 5.5. Identify assumptions, relevant information, alternative solutions, and societal or civic issues related to economic problems, and use critical thinking to propose solutions.
