- Shortly after I arrived at A&M-Commerce, I started hearing from deans, department heads, and others about how complicated scheduling classes had become. In the last couple months, my office has been utilizing data and meeting with others to take a comprehensive look at what processes might be in place that are creating the complications, how students might be impacted, and studying how we can reduce the burden of scheduling concerns on faculty and staff. We have identified several factors that have contributed to various challenges and are taking immediate steps to improve

how courses are scheduled. These include eliminating many of the subterms that had been created, adhering to the course rotation schedules departments created for undergraduate programs in 2019, and creating course rotation schedules for graduate programs.

These changes will allow faculty, students, and advisors to be able to know several semesters in advance which courses will be offered and how students can complete their degree in as short a timeframe as possible to maximize financial aid and minimize a student's financial burden. You should start seeing some of these changes as soon as the Fall 2023 semester, and certainly even more by Spring 2024. I am optimistic that these tweaks to the schedule will not only help the university's space-usage efficiency, and ensure that we are best leveraging our resources, but also promote stability and reduce the stress that faculty, staff, and students experience related to course scheduling.

• Dr. Ron Carter, who has extensive experience and is nationally recognized as an expert in leadership development, visited our campus a couple weeks ago, meeting with the leadership in Academic Affairs. Dr. Carter, who is in the process of getting to know our university, will be working with our division to implement mentoring activities, workshops, and possibly a course on leadership in the fall as part of our continued development of leadership training opportunities for our division. Although much of his work will be virtual, his next visit to campus will be June 20 through June 21.
