Course Description: Ear Training III is the third in a three-course sequence that examines the

aural and sight singing skills of the notation, structure and development

of Western Music.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to accomplish the following in each category:

- Sing diatonic and chromatic melodies, using solfeggio
- Be able to identify, correct, and reproduce harmonic and melodic concepts after a few hearings
- Demonstrate the same ability in accurately transcribing tonal music from repeated hearings.
- Utilize all these skills so as to improve performance skills for private/ group lesson performance and ensembles.

Course Requirements: Ear Training is a skill-based topic delivered in a lab-based format. In other words, it is imperative that you come to class regularly and participate in all class activities. This material cannot be learned on your own with a book. As with performance, this material also requires regular and methodical attention.

> Class time will regularly be divided between singing and a variety of dictation exercises. Sessions will include a mix of lecture, discussion, group and individual activity, singing (mostly as a class), and dictation.

> There will be eight tests given over the course of the semester, evenly

divided between singing and aural activities and administered during class time. On occasion we may need to schedule singing test times outside of class, but this will only be done when absolutely necessary. It is imperative that the student notifies the instructor about any possible conflicts with examinations before the exam is scheduled. The instructor is under no obligation to create and schedule make-up times for missed exams.

Exams: 65% Class Participation: 10%
