## **Course Description**

This course covers the role of statistics in engineering, probability, discrete and continuous probability distributions, joint probability distributions, random sampling and data description, point estimation, and statistical intervals. (Prerequisites: MATH 192 or concurrent enrollment).

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Use statistical methodology and tools in the engineering problem-solving process.
- 2. Complete and interpret descriptive statistics using numerical and graphical techniques.
- 3. Understand the basic concepts of probability, random variables, probability distribution, and joint probability distribution.
- 4. Compute the point estimation of parameters, explain sampling distribution and joint probability distribution.
- 5. Construct confidence intervals on parameters for a single simple.

## **Brief Explanation of Course Assessments**

**Homework:** There will be a total of 3 homework assignments. Each homework will help students understand the topic and have practice on solving engineering statistics problems.

**Pop-Quizzes:** "a short test that a teacher gives to students without warning" "an unscheduled or unannounced quiz" (Definitions retrieved from <a href="https://www.merriam-webster.com">www.merriam-webster.com</a>)

To assess students' progress, pop-quizzes will be given during the semester. The frequency of these pop-quizzes will be determined by the instructor based on students' active participation/involvement in class.

**Participation, Full Attendance:** A student, who attends all class sessions and very participative/involved, will receive 5 points from this category. Each absence is -1 point from the maximum 5 points possible. The instructor will take attendance at each class. Class Attendance Requirement (one lateness of more than 5 minutes = 1/2 absence)
