Course Description: In this course, we will examine the essential principles of music theory

through the vantage points of different music theory resources and musical scores. We will compare and contrast the approaches and discuss the pedagogical approaches found in each, including the classroom application methods that accompany these theoretical and

instructional models.

Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- Prepare a course lecture on a theory topic, including lecture, classwork and homework.
- Express various theory topics with musical examples
- Be able to identify the pros and cons of various music theoritcal approaches
- Lecture on theory materials in the full spectrum of harmonic languages: tonal, chromatic and atonal
- Be able to properly assess knowledge acquisition of a group from their given lecture.

Course Elements:

Examinations will consist of both short answer and essay questions and will be administered during class sessions.

Quizzes A primary goal of this course is the creation of a textbook. Throughout the semester, each student will prepare a keynote lecture on three topics

- 1. tonal
- 2. chromatic
- 3. atonal

These lectures will count as quiz grades and should be viewed as a 'teaching studio' environment – thoughtful feedback will be provided by

the participants of the prepared lecture.

Additional Credit for Quizzes may be earned throughout the semester through the tutoring of undergraduate students in music theory. I would like each student to do this at least once during the semester. To receive credit for tutoring, you will need to write a thoughtful 750 word paper discussing what happened in your tutoring session. Where was the student mis-reading information? what did you say that helped the information 'click'? What musical examples were you analyzing? How did you get the student to move forward?

Each student will give a 40-min **Presentation** on a topic related to music theory and pre-approved by the instructor. The presentation should be created using keynote and feature text, score examples, audio examples and piano performance by the instructor. Additional information will be provided during the semester.
